CCL: How did you land your internship?

AK: I had heard of Live Nation through a friend who worked there and applied online through internmatch.org.

CCL: How has your internship helped shape your career goals?

AK: I have interned at a variety of places and interning at Live

Nation has taught me that the live event industry is what I want to do

professionally. I've learned how to work different venues, met the staff who run
these venues, and have learned more about the music industry as a whole. I've
enjoyed my internship so much that I extended it into a second quarter.

CCL: What skills did you learn on the job that go above and beyond what you have learned in your college courses?

AK: I've learned about marketing and sales, both of which are not courses offered at UCLA. I've also gained hands-on experience working venues, creating Spotify playlists, and using our social media, which I would not have been able to do through traditional classes.

CCL: What were the benefits of taking a 195CE course through the Center for Community Learning? What did you learn by meeting with a coordinator and pairing your internship with academic research?

AK: At first, I questioned how my music-industry internship would correlate with the History 195CE course, but my History 195CE course coordinator explained how there is history behind everything, which I had never thought of before. By completing the weekly writing assignments, I learned a lot about the music business.
